### What is the HCCH?





- An intergovernmental organisation with a legislative function – origin goes back to 1893
- Works toward "progressive unification of the rules of private international law" (Art. 1, Statute)
- Develops and adopts Hague Conventions and Protocols (currently 39 + 1 soft law instrument), dealing with:
  - (1) Int'l Civil Procedure & Legal Co-operation
  - (2) Int'l Family Law & Child Protection
  - (3) Int'l Commercial Law & Finance Law
- Practical outcomes, with direct benefits

## **Key Questions**



#### **JURISDICTION**

The authorities of which State are competent to decide on questions arising from a cross-border situation?

#### **APPLICABLE LAW**

The law of which State applies to a cross-border situation?

# RECOGNITION & ENFORCEMENT

How can judgments or decisions of a State be recognised or enforced abroad?

#### CO-OPERATION

How can authorities better co-operate to improve efficiency and overcome the obstacles arising in cross-border situations?

NB: The HCCH does <u>not</u> deal with substantive law – instead building bridges across legal systems, (incl. civil law, common law, Sharia law) respecting legal diversity


### **HCCH Members**




- 87 HCCH Members (Namibia, Jan 2021; Thailand, expected March 2021)
- 40 new members since 2000 (45% of Membership),
   14 from Asia pacific
- 154 States "Connected" with HCCH (68 non-HCCH Members that is a Contracting Party or Signatory to at least One Hague Convention or in the process of becoming a Member)

## Regional Office for Asia and the Pacific, HCCH



- Opened in 2012 with the mission to act as a bridge to enhance communications and understanding between the Permanent Bureau of the HCCH in the Hague and the States in the Asia-Pacific region.
  - Promote Hague Conventions and build networks within the region
  - Facilitate good practice and consistent implementation of the conventions, etc.

# **Resulting Benefits of Hague Conventions**



#### Facilitating international trade, commerce and foreign direct investment

1

For example, the *Apostille*, *Service of Process*, *Taking of Evidence*, *Access to Justice*, *Choice of Court*, *Judgments* and *Securities* Conventions, as well as the *Hague Principles* provide *legal certainty* and *predictability* and establish *uniform global standards*, leading to a climate more conducive to cross-border trade and investment; some of these Conventions also greatly enhance administrative and judicial *co-operation between States* 

#### Giving effect to human rights

For example, the *Child Abduction*, *Child Protection*, *Adoption*, and *Child Support* (alimony) Conventions give effect to fundamental principles expounded in the 1989 *UN Convention on the Rights of the Child* (see also Hague *Adults* Convention which furthers some of the goals of the 2006 *UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities*)

## The HCCH in action



#### At the Permanent Bureau

- Budget of the HCCH is € 4.1 million (approx. US\$ 4.8 million)
- Fewer than 30 members staff
- Smaller context for Experts' & Working Groups, or Standing Committee (up to 40 participants)





#### At the Hague Academy Building (Peace Palace)

- Larger Context for plenary-style meetings:
  - Special Commissions
  - Council on General Affairs
  - Council of Diplomatic Representatives
  - Diplomatic sessions
- Up to 300 participants
