Prof. Nadja Alexander

Nadja Alexander is an award winning author, conflict intervention professional, and independent adviser on mediation policy to international bodies and national governments. Nadja holds professorial appointments Australia and the United States. She is a Principal of Conflict Coaching International.

Nadja has worked in conflict resolution settings in more than 30 countries. She is listed in the International Who's Who of Commercial Mediation and practices in the English and German languages.

A recognised thought leader in dispute resolution, Prof. Nadja Alexander plays an international leadership role in mediation policy making, law and practice. In Hong Kong, she is a member of the Steering Committee on Mediation and the Chair of the Apology Group of the Hong Kong Mediation Steering Committee.

Her research has been used in arguments before the Canadian Supreme Court, international arbitral awards, and mediation legislation in Europe, the Middle East and a number of Asian jurisdictions. She has been engaged as an adviser by international organisations such as the World Bank, the OSCE and the IFC. In 2015 she was a Humboldt Fellow at the Max Planck Institute in Germany. Currently she is working on the International Task Force on Mixed Mode Dispute Resolution hosted by the Straus Institute at Pepperdine University in the US.

Nadja has published more than 10 books and 100 papers on conflict resolution and her work has appeared in the English, German, Russian, French, Arabic and Chinese languages. Nadja is editor of the international book series, Global Trends in Dispute Resolution and co-editor of the Kluwer Mediation Blog. Her major legal work, International Comparative Mediation: Legal Perspectives, won the CPR Award for Outstanding ADR book (New York 2011).

Described as a practical thinker and a thinking practitioner, Nadja is known for the passion, energy and creativity she brings to her various roles.
